## **FRIDAY 1<sup>ST</sup> JUNE - THE CONVENTION BEGINS**

Registration at the Holiday Inn began at 1pm. Delegates enjoyed cheese and fruit platters and a range of wines for tasting from Ad Hoc winery.

The registration packs and convention booklets provided included an interesting and helpful array of information including:

The Convention Handbook included a welcome from Darwin President and Convention Chairman Jason Schoolmeester, Convention Programme, places to visit, Restaurants, dress code, lists of delegates, useful telephone numbers and Convention Supporters: Rockbare Wines and Crocosaurus Cove.

## OPENING PARTY - 6.30 TO 11.30 PM

The Friday welcome function was at Crocosaurus Cove, located in the heart of the city, an informal venue that reflected Darwin and the Top End. On arrival staff members cradled various reptiles including lizards, crocodiles and snakes for our inspection and even a gentle pat. During the evening delegates were able to also get closely acquainted with them as well and for the adventurous feed the crocodiles.

Food stations served an array of food including Australian prawn cutlets served with tropical mango and coconut salsa in a paper cone, sumptuous Coffin Bay oysters topped with lemon grass and coriander dressing served in their shell and bush tomato butter chicken. These were accompanied by 2011 Mojo Sauvignon Blanc and 2008 Coriole McLaren Vale Nebbiolo Rose.

Delegates were welcomed with speeches from Jason Schoolmeester, Darwin Mayor Katrina Fong Lim, who officially opened the convention, and International President Brian Lilley.

One of the highlights of the evening was the inclusion of examples of grain and grass fed Angus beef supplied by T&R Pastoral Pty Ltd, Murray Bridge South Australia. Both the grain and grass fed beef cuts were delicious.

The reds, 2011 Mojo Shiraz and 2008 Torpedo Rocks Cabernet Sauvignon from Margaret River drank well with the beef and the Torpedo Rocks was particularly suited to the savannah lamb which was also being served.

Tropical fruits and various cheese selections completed the meal and Vertigo 2008 Adelaide Hills Riesling and Bird in the Hand Clare Valley Honeysuckle Riesling had a touch of sweetness about them which complimented the cheese and fruits.

## **SATURDAY MORNING BUSINESS SESSION**

The Business Session began at 9.30. For non-members there was an alternative activity of a bus trip to Parap Village Saturday Market. International President Brian Lilley opened proceedings by introducing General Secretary Craig Thornquest, Vice President Paul Kershaw and Past President Peter Johnston. There were 239 delegates at the convention representing 39 clubs.

Main points were:

- Website a work in progress being continually improved. Now the main source of information following the discontinuing of "B&Bulletin".
- Handbook now to be issued as Calendar Year. Still in hard copy owing to confidentiality.
- Branch Affiliation fees will see a nominal increase of \$10 and late fee \$50 for local clubs and half those figures for overseas clubs.
- There is a detailed explanation of Life Members procedures on website.
- New business tie embraced by members as sales brisk.
- 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversaries 2011/12 - Middleback, Beijing, Yarra Falls and Mackay.
- 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversaries 2011/12 - Port Phillip, Caxton, Somerton, Holdfast, The Rocks and Mirrabooka.
- During 2011/12 six new clubs have formed including three in China.

A website presentation was made offering support to clubs considering setting up their own website.

It is pleasing to see that there are clubs keen to host conventions and entertaining presentations were made, firstly by Yarrawonga Mulwala complete with the haunting song "I'm going back to Yarrawonga" and an animated drinking bull taking a sip from its wine glass - 22<sup>nd</sup> to 24<sup>th</sup> March 2013 with a trip to Rutherglen on the Monday.

Presentations were also made by Brighton, Lockleys and Burnside jointly for 2014, probably 10<sup>th</sup> to 12<sup>th</sup> October and John Bowen, Hobart, for 2016, probably 22<sup>nd</sup> to 24<sup>th</sup> May, their 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary.

During General Business the possibility of having a convention overseas was raised. A brief account from Past President Phil Kleinig about his visit to China, along with some other members of the Adelaide Club, for the 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Beijing Club highlighted the abundant attractions of China, the fine food and French inspired

wines were of great interest to those present. It was quite clear that a convention in China would be strongly supported by those present.

There was some confusion among delegates about the origins of “The Duck” that has been turning up at conventions since 2000 in Alice Springs. It is hoped that a video of the explanation of the origins of The Duck can be found and made available. This was of the late Rod Beaumont, Convention Chairman of Launceston Club, for the 1999 Convention explaining its origins.

### **SATURDAY GALA DINNER 6.30 To 11.30PM**

Some regretted that many of our past traditions have “withered on the vine”.
